TEACHING YOUNG ADOLESCENTS

Teaching young adolescents is a privilege, and a challenge! These young people are experiencing the greatest physical, emotional, intellectual and social changes in their lives.

Did you know . . .

- The 10-14 year age group is the only age group whose psychosocial health status has not improved in the last 40 years.
- Between 10-14 years the brain goes through a second growth spurt. This is a period of "use it or lose it".
- Puberty represents the greatest change that students face during schooling. It is a time where many disengage from adults, both parents and teachers. As a consequence, some disengage from the learning process.
- The 10-14 year old's brain is not developed enough for them to make sensible decisions without help and guidance. This age group is described by research as having the highest incidence of "dropping out" of education. If we lose them now, it is difficult to get them back.
- During early adolescence, students are most likely to challenge prevailing values, before firming up their own personal values system.

As teachers of young adolescents we are always aware of the following:

- Nothing is more important to success with young adolescents than solid and supportive relationships. When these students believe we care about and respect them, they are more likely to join us in
- learning.
 Young adolescents learn best when they are engaged with topics, issues, and problems that have meaning and relevance for them.
- No matter what they say or how they look, young adolescents still have a lot of child in them (more "*young"* than "*adolescent"*). They still need and want support and guidance from adults who know and care about them.
- Young adolescents learn best when they have the support and understanding of their families.

International research gives clear signals as to what teachers should be doing to meet the needs of these students:

- teaching students about strategies for learning on their own
- setting gradually higher expectations
- building analytical and problem solving skills
- recognising and building on past learning experiences
- preparing students for transition to secondary school.

Teachers at Remuera Intermediate School recognise that teaching pre-adolescents is "special". We are fortunate to have teachers who are committed to, and passionate about, teaching this age-group.

In the end, the path to student engagement starts where young people are, and helps them where they need to go.

On the way, the more they can find and use their voices to express who they are and what they want, the greater is the likelihood that they will seek and find what they need Engagement is a habit of mind and heart. It is what we want young people to cultivate not just to get their diplomas, but as a lifelong way of being. It is what we want our schools and programs to foster with every aspect of their curriculum, organisation and culture. To engage young people requires of us what we ask of them: full commitment, a belief that it is possible, and vision of a viable and productive future. (Joselowsky, 2007)
