A GREAT START TO 2016

Congratulations to our students for a great start to the new school year. We have been impressed with the way students have settled into new classes, and it has been pleasing to see so many becoming involved in the extra activities offered. The leadership and responsibility displayed by our Yr 8 students is impressive, and they are proving to be excellent role models.

The friendly and positive atmosphere throughout the school is certainly a credit to all concerned. Students very quickly come to know that they are respected and valued, and in turn show their respect for the school by working hard, displaying excellent manners and wearing their uniforms in the appropriate way. Their good behaviour in public – on the streets, on buses, in shops and at sports events – brings credit to themselves and their school. Our teachers are enthusiastic, and work hard to provide excellent classroom programmes, and also a wide range of extra activities for the students.

REPORTING TO PARENTS

As part of the implementation of National Standards, schools are required to report to parents in writing and using plain language at least twice a year. At least one of the written Reports should include :

- The student's current learning goals
- The student's achievement and progress in relation to the National Standards
- What the school will do to support the student's learning
- What parents, family and whanau can do to support their child's learning.

<u>Year 7</u> – it is important that our Year 7 students are assessed early in the year so that teaching and learning can be at appropriate levels. With students joining RI from over 40 primary schools we need to ensure consistency in our assessments and Overall Teacher Judgement.

There will be parent interviews for Year 7 students at the beginning of Term 2. Teachers and parents will be able to discuss achievement, progress, effort and attitude, as well as personal and social development.

Year 7 students will receive a written Report at the end of Term 2 and a final Report at the end of the year.

<u>Year 8</u> – Year 8 teachers have valuable information passed onto them by Yr 7 teachers. At the beginning of the school year they use assessments to confirm and review this information.

There will be parent interviews for Year 8 students at the beginning of Term 2. This will provide an opportunity for parents and teachers to discuss where students 'are at', what the next steps should be, and the general well-being of the student.

Year 8 students will receive a written Report at the end of Term 2, and a further Report at the end of the year.

AWARDS ASSEMBLIES

The school celebrates student achievement through regular Awards Assemblies. The Awards Assemblies are held once a term throughout the school year. The school wants to recognise excellence in achievement, consistent effort to improve and the qualities of citizenship. Classroom teachers and specialist teachers present chosen students with certificates. The assemblies also provide an opportunity for our school choir and orchestra and individual musicians to perform. Where possible, teachers invite the parents of the award recipients to the Assembly. At this school, achievement is highly valued and promoted.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Emergency procedures are important for school safety. Our school works with an independent company, Harrison Tew, who specialise in emergency management for schools. The procedures implemented allow us to respond safely and quickly to a range of circumstances.

The company's Directors are both ex-Police and the procedures are in line with that of emergency services response.

Throughout the year we 'practise' procedures and exercises relating to earthquakes, lock-downs, fire and other hazards.

Should you hear of a lock down or evacuation at the school, can I please ask that you do not attend the school or phone, as we will not be in a position to respond. Your presence or contact may make it more difficult for us to manage a situation.

Any information pertaining to an emergency occurring at the school will be updated on our website as regularly as possible.
